MLA In-Text Citation Format

General guidelines

- 1. The in-text citation should have the first thing that is seen in the full MLA citation in the Works Cited section. This is generally either the author or title.
- 2. The in-text citation should always go INSIDE the punctuation.
 - a. Example: A survivor of Lori's class said, "I typed so much my fingers were worn to nubbins" (Smith 35).
 - b. Example: A piece of German propaganda portrayed Jews as rats, or vermin (Hofstadder 35).

If the piece has an AUTHOR and PAGE #s:

1. (Author last name page) Ex: (Fisher 35)

If the piece has an AUTHOR and PAGE #s, but you've mentioned the author name in the quote set-up:

1. (page) Ex: (17)

If the piece has an AUTHOR and NO PAGE #s (like a website):

2. (Author last name) Ex: (Fisher)

If the piece has NO AUTHOR and PAGE #s:

3. (Title page) Ex: (High School Drama 15)

If the piece has NO AUTHOR and NO PAGE #s (like a website):

4. (Title) Ex: (Monkey Cats and Their Bananas)

If the piece has NO AUTHOR and PAGE #s, but you've mentioned the author name in the quote set-up:

1. (page)
